THE GAME

On New Years Day at the Tournament of Roses in California, two of the greatest football elevens met to decide the football supremacy of the United States in a game which will go down on one of the brightest pages of history.

Although the varsity game was rather slow it showed that the team is in good form for the Roslyn game this Wednesday afternoon at Roslyn. Last Friday Roslyn beat Great Neck 29-23 during which Roslyn showed some fine playing. The Port girls open their season the same day playing the Roslyn girls.
