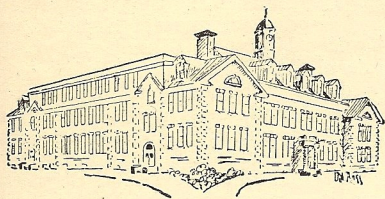

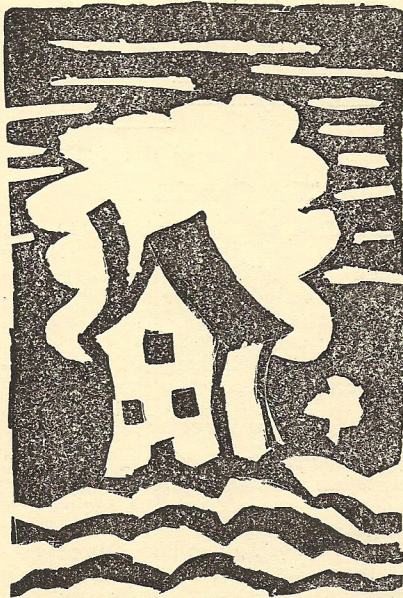

Registration for Voters

On the 17th of May the qualified voters of the school district are to vote on the proposition to build a new high school on the Flower Hill site, and to build a new grade school in the Sands Point district on the site recently purchased.

Residents of the school district who own or rent homes or who have a child in the Port Washington Public Schools are eligible to vote on this question. To be permitted to vote, however, each voter must register at the high school in person on Saturday, May 7th, between the hours of 10.00 a.m. and 9.00 p.m., daylight saving time.

The proposition to be voted on is one of vital importance to the whole village and should receive the careful consideration of every resident. Every qualified voter should be sure to register at the specified time and place and come out to vote on Tuesday, May 17th. The Board of Education has prepared a circular containing the facts regarding the proposition to be submitted. A copy of this circular is to be taken home by each school pupil during this week and arrangements have been made to have some members of the Boy Scouts deliver a circular to each home in Port Washington. By this method the Board hopes every voter will be fully informed as to the proposed action.
