PORT BEATS ROSLYN AFTER THREE RUN RALLY

Score 7-6

The Port baseball team seemed to be half asleep during the early innings of last Friday's game with Roslyn and in less than no time the visitors had a sizeable lead. Port woke up, however, after Whalen had hit a home run in the third inning with Peters on base. From then on Roslyn got only one hit and no runs off Raymond Smith's deliveries and Port began to cut down the lead.

The first pair of runs were chalked up in Port's half of the third. Nick Salerno was safe on a wild throw to first by the visiting third baseman. Nick tried to score when Polk's grounder trickled through second but was nabbed at the plate. "Toots" Terrell singled sending Polk to third and stole second unmolested. Stanley Kurejwo slammed a single to left field scoring Polk and Terrell.

Roslyn's lead was whittled down some more in the fifth. Terrell's grounder bounced through the infield, the pitcher, the short stop and the second baseman all making a stab at it. Stanley Kurejwo again singled and Hugh Gilbert scored them both with a hit over second.

Port was still 2 runs in arrears going into the last half of the last inning. Polk started things off with a grounder that Distel threw wild to first. Terrell dumped a roller along the third base line. The pitcher fielded the ball and threw to third. Polk slid into the bag before Adelstein could touch him. He turned his ankle on the play, however, and Sinkinson ran for him. Kurejwo fled out but Tom Leyden, who had fallen a victim to Mierzejeuski's curves and slow ball in his previous times at bat and who seemed about to do so again, rolled a ball off his shoulder and was given a free ticket to first. Hugh Gilbert drove in the tying runs with another clean single to center. Raymond Smith fanned for the second out but Phil Seraphine, the boy who was supposed to be so shy with the willow, came through with a ringing double to left field. Leyden and Gilbert scored and the ball game was over.

This was Raymond Smith's first victory as a pitcher. "Smithy" always seemed to have one bad inning. At Manhasset it was the sixth. Last Friday the bad inning came early enough so that his team-mates could step out and tie the score before the game ended.

For awhile in the third inning things looked pretty bad. With two out, Distel singled and Smith walked Mierzejeuski and Fish. "Smithy" had to sacrifice some of his speed in order to get the ball over the plate and Peters singled. Whalen wafted the ball over the

fence in left right along the foul line. The Port sluggers have yet to take advantage of this fence and collect a few homers for themselves.

Bob Geddes was robbed of a pair of hits in his two times at bat by a couple of fine catches. Both were line drives that were headed for the wide, open spaces behind second base. Distel grabbed the first with a driving catch and Whalen speared the other with the gloved hand with a leap into the air.

In spite of these flashy catches, the Port infield was much steadier than Roslyn's. The only misplay was a wild throw to first by Smith on Mierzejeuski's bunt.

Mr. Seeber shuffled the batting order before the game, moving Tom Leyden up a place and dropping Terrell to eighth position. Stanley Kurejwo remains as lead-off man and Raymond Smith in the clean up position.

If you see any Mineola, Manhasset, Great Neck or Glen Cove players slapping each other on the back, there is a reason for it. It has been definitely decided that Charles Evanosky is ineligible to pitch this year because of the ruling that a player can only compete four years in any sport. Charley pitched two innings of a post season game against Mineola back in 1925.

Port plays Mineola next Friday afternoon on the Main Street field. On May 21, the last Tuesday game of the season is played. This also is a home game and Glen Cove is the visiting team. The results of some other league games were in the paper on Saturday morning. Mineola defeated Manhasset and Great Neck beat Glen Cove.

Port Beats Manhasset

Last Saturday afternoon Port won a easy victory over Manhasset in the first duel meet ever staged between the two rival schools. Port overwhelmed its opponents by the one-sided count of 116 to 28. Port men were able to capture fourteen first places to Manhasset's six.

Chester Cipriani, of Port walked off with both the 220-yard dash and broad jump. Other double winners of the day were Captain Williamson, C. Newman, H. Swede, A. Allen, and W. Sellers. Parrot, Arnold and Hickock were alone able to capture firsts for Manhasset. Summary of Senior and open events:

100-yard Dash—won by Newman, Port Washington; Cipriani, Port second; Hickock, Manhasset, third. Time, 11:5.

220-yard dash— won by Cipriani, Port; Newman, Port, second; Prewain, Manhasset, third. Time, 25:6.
