PORT WINS NORTH SHORE MEET, GREAT NECK IS CLOSE SECOND

Port Scores 41 1-4,

Great Neck 38 1-4

The first North Shore meet was held at the Flower Hill field last Saturday and will go down in the books as a victory for Port Washington. Port had no easy time of it, by any means, and did not clinch first place until the next to the last event, the Junior relay. Great Neck was strong in the last few events and closed a big gap. Port's final total was 41 1-4, Great Neck's 38 1-4. Next came Sea Cliff with 25, Hicksville 21 1-2, Westbury 18, Oyster Bay 13 1-4, Manhasset 9, Roslyn 6, and Mineola 3 3-4.

More than half of Port's points were scored in the Junior events. Chester Cipriani galloped away with the 100-yard dash and also copped the running broad jump. Bill Sellers took a fourth in the century. Hillard Swede took second in the 8-pound shot put and tied for third in the high jump. Joe Ciminera added 2 points with a third place in the 220.

The Junior half mile relay, the race that won the meet, was a thriller from start to finish. Sellers gave Port a lead at the start but Jenkins was overhauled by a Hicksville runner. Joe Ciminera cut down most of the lead and left it up to "Art" Allen to do the rest. Art had been a disappointment in the 220 but he certainly did run in the relay. He passed the Hicksville anchor man going around the turn and came in the winner by a good 5 yards. The Senior relay team made an extra 2 points by taking third.

Port did not fare so well in the events for boys over 120 pounds. Evanosky earned a point in the shot put and Newman in the 220. Bauer made 3-4 of a point in the high jump.

The remarkable time of 4 minutes, 59 3-10 seconds was made in the mile run. Tom Williamsen was expected to walk away with this event but two runners stuck to his heels and challenged him in the last lap. They ran three abreast down the back stretch. Beam, the Sea Cliff entry, had the most strength in reserve and finished in front. Williamsen faltered in the Sinnott, of Westbury, treat Neck, took second

Port Loses To Great Neck, 11-4

The Port baseball team lost its second straight game last Friday, losing to Great Neck on the Main Street field by a score of 11-4. Two bad innings caused the defeat. Cletus Polk pitched well for the first part of the game but weakened in the sixth and was replaced by Raymond Smith. Clark went the route for the visitors and helped to win his own game with a home run over the left field fence with one on base.

The Port team fell on Clark in the first as if it meant to make short work of him. Stanley Kurejwo beat out a roller along the third base line; Hugh Glibert singled, and Leyden walked to fill the bases with none out. Raymond Smith grounded to Stephens, who threw to first. When Ninesing dropped the ball. Smitty was safe. Phil Seraphine's line double over second scored two.

Clark improved as the game progressed. Port had men on bases in each inning but could not bring them in. Great Neck made threatening gestures in the first and fourth but was stopped short by a pair of fine double plays started by Stanley Kurejwo. The entire team, however, blew up in the fifth. Seagroat doubled and Clark hit his homer. A double, a walk, an error and a hit batsman produced 4 runs. Smith relieved Polk. Another run scored when he and Seraphine both went after the same pop fly. Neither of them caught it.

Great Neck scored 6 more in the next frame on three hits and 4 bad errors. Port's last run came in the sixth on a walk, an error and a 2bagger by Tom Leyden.
