

Port Tramples Glen Cove 19-2

Smith Scores 3 Touchdowns

The Port gridders met the Glen Cove eleven at Glen Cove last Saturday and defeated them by a score of 19-2. Raymond Smith led the team to victory, scoring all three of Port's touchdowns

Both teams were unable to score during the first frame. In the second quarter a Glen Cove player intercepted a pass and almost made a touchdown. Port threw back Glen Cove's four attempts on the 1-yard line to cross the last barrier, and took the ball on downs. Immediately afterward, however, Port essayed a punt which was blocked and recovered behind her own goal line. This gave the Red team a two point lead over the Blue and White. The first half ended shortly afterwards.

In the second half Port displayed an offense which Glen Cove was unable to check. Plunging through the line for incessant gains, Smith and Polk were greatly responsible for Port's three tallies.

Most of the team played their last football game Saturday. The result indicates that there is no doubt that they were fighting hard to end their football career in a blaze of glory. Despite numerous injuries our veteran players and the material available, Coach Costello has put out a scrappy team.
