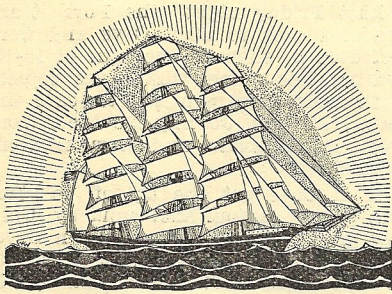

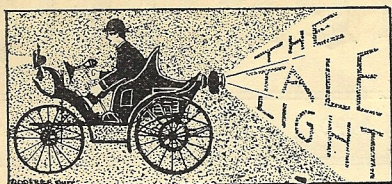
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## Junior Class Buys

## Boy's Team Loses To Glen Cove 16-13

### Four Men Put Out On Fouls

Last Friday night the Port team traveled over to Glen Cove and were defeated by them to the tune of 16-13. During this game, which was replete with fouls, four men had to leave the game, Jenkins, Johnny De Meo, from Port; Bauxebaum and Anzalone from Glen Cove.

Glen Cove got the tip off to start the game. A foul shot sunk by Murray gave the first score to Glen Cove. Then "Kosky" and "Strap" sunk two fouls, making Port take a lead of 2-1. Two more foul shots by Glen Cove and a basket by Jenkins made the score 4-4 at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter a foul by Bauxebaum gave the opponents the lead. Two fouls by Jenkins, missed by that worthy, were followed by a Kurewjo to Polk combination which scored a basket. Score 6-5.

At this point Gilbert was substituted for Frank Jenkins and Kurewjo was temporary captain on the floor. A foul by Glen Cove and a shot from the side by Murray brought the home team in the lead 6-8. So the half ended.

A foul on Bauxebaum by De Meo tallied a point in Glen Cove's favor followed by three foul shots by Jenkins of which he sunk one. Score 7-9. Continuing in this vein, De Meo fouled and was taken out of the game for his fourth foul. Teta subbed.

Then Jenkins and Genova each scored field goals. Joe Teta scored on a foul and Bauxebaum was taken out for his fourth foul also. Burn substituted for him. Two more fouls on Jenkins which were sunk to our benefit made the tally 12-11. To end the quarter Murray sank a foul shot and the score was again all even 12-12.

In the last quarter Jenkins was put out on his fourth foul and Nick Salerno was subbed in his place.

Two baskets by Glen Cove and a foul shot by Kurewjo ended the game 13-16 with the home team the winner.
