Fifty Candidates Start Practice

Fifty candidates answered Mr. Seeber's call at the baseball meeting Monday afternoon, and the following afternoon saw the first of Port's practices in the rear of the gym.

The boys have a tough schedule ahead of them in the same teams that constituted the basketball league the past season.

The Port varsity stars of the past season played another game last Saturday evening. The famous Manhasset Cubs furnished the opposition but were completely outclassed.

The All Stars played a neat game to finish on the long end of a 39—29 count. Although the game was played away from home, in the Manhasset High gym, the fellows having acquired full confidence in themselves, played their best post season tilt.

The All Stars spurted into a tenpoint advantage before the Cubs registered a single point. Joe Teta started the scoring with an overhand shot from a difficult angle. Johnny Meo followed with a beautiful hook shot from side court. "Dan" Sullivan, Stanley Kurejwo and Frank Jenkins sank three in quick succession before Manhasset called for a rest period. After this time out, the Cubs reorganized to score nine points while the locals remained scoreless. The score was 10—9 at the end of the first quarter.

In the second stanza, the All Stars recuperated from Manhasset's unexpected attack and easily pulled ahead. Sherry, of Manhasset, kept his team in the running, when he sank baskets from mid-court to bring the score at half time 16—13, in favor of Port.

As the second half opened the Cubs threatened to overtake the All Stars but were left hopeless by Kurejwo, Jenkins and Sullivan. These three kept possession of the ball by passing in and out of Manhasset's defence until someone was in scoring position.

Manhasset followers yelled frantically for their players to break up the passing. Then the Stars attempted long shots and were successful. They maintained an average of .500 in tossing them in from mid-court. The three forward men registered almost every time they tried to score.

This Friday the All Stars meet the Sea Cliff warriors in a return tilt. The field of battle will be the Methodist Church gym. Two other games are billed for the same evening. Members of the girls varsity will play the Epworth League lassies, while the Boys of the same club will meet a talented Sea Cliff aggregation. The boys of the League will be reinforced with stars of the varsity five. Because of this fact, they are favored to avenge an early season trouncing. Admission will be only ten cents.
