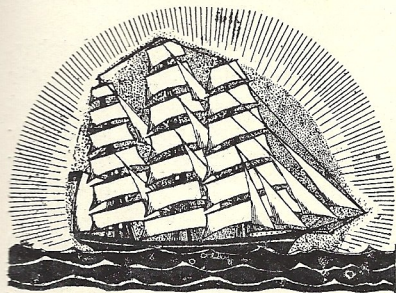

Omnes Aetates Vergilium Laudant

Just 2000 years before October 15, 1930 Vergil, the greatest of Roman poets was born in a little village near Mantua. All over the world commemorative exercises of the bimillenary of his birth are being held. There have been great festivals all during the summer and autumn; Vergilion tours and cruises, pilgrimages to Mantua, Cremona, Rome, and Naples. Great libraries have exhibited priceless relics. The Italian Academy has offered a prize of 5000 lire for the best ode to Vergil. A set of bimillenary stamps has been issued by the Royal Post Office of Italy. Places Vergil may never even have seen, but whose praises he sung in his verses, are the scenes of great exercises. It would seem that no poet has ever enjoyed such a universal celebration.

Vergil is said to have been buried not far from his seaside villa near Naples, where there is a tomb which has enjoyed the reverence of the Ages. The Italian government acquired this tomb in 1924. It was quite inaccessible before, but now paths have been made to enable people to visit it.

Next Monday, at their first meeting this year, the Latin club intends to have a program somewhat in keeping with this event.

Pomander Walk Is Annual Production

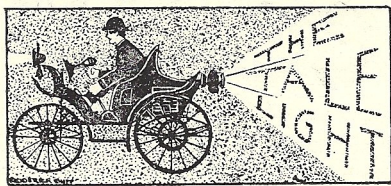
Red Domino will present its first play of the season, "The Wonder Hat", this afternoon, Thursday, October 16th during the eighth period.
