

Port Defeated In Last Game

On Saturday, November twentysecond, Glen Cove vanquished Port's eleven 19-16. This was Port's third defeat in seven games.

Port kicked off to Glen Cove's ten yard line, but the ball was run back to their twenty-five yard line. After several plays, a line plunge was made, and Polk went over for a touchdown with DeMeo making the extra point. After a series of plays by both teams. Port pushed the ball to Glen Cove's forty yard line, was penalized fifteen yards, and threw a pass which was intercepted by Glen Cove and was run for a touchdown.

During the second quarter Glen Cove made a twenty-eight yard run resulting in a touchdown. After another series of plays by both teams, Glen Cove made a long end run which brought them to Port's two yard line. They then went over for their third touchdown. Their try for the extra point was successful

The second half opened by Port's kicking to Glen Cove. After some punting Port pushed down the field for a touchdown by DeMeo, and an extra point by Terrell. Port then kicked off to Glen Cove who punted to the center of the field and ended the third quarter.

In the last quarter, Port pushed the ball to Glen Cove's fourteen yard line, and then lost it on downs. Kalinosky recovered a fumble by Glen Cove on the other side of the end zone, resulting in a safety, and two points for Port. After another short play the whistle blew, ending the last game of the season.

An Ancient Rival Is Vanquished Foe

Port Victorious by 6-0

On Tuesday, November fourteenth, Port defeated Manhasset by a score of 6-0. This was Port's third victory of the season, and one of the most exciting games.

The game started by Port's kicking off to Manhasset. The ball stayed near the center of the field during the first quarter. Manhasset made three incomplete passes, blocked one of Port's punts, and secured two first down. Port made one first down. At the end of the quarter Lafferty substituted for Karazia.

In the second quarter Manhasset reached the two yard line by completing two passes, then fumbled the ball on the next play, and Kalinosky from Port recovered it. Then Port punted out of danger. In this quarter Terrell was hurt while trying to catch a pass, and Kosofski substituted for him. Manhasset made four incomplete passes and two first downs. Port completed a pass, made one incomplete pass, and two first downs.

At the start of the second half, Terrell replaced Kosofski who had substituted for him. After one kick out of bounds a successful kickoff was made. In this first play DeMeo was hurt but stayed in the game. Manhasset punted to Port. Polk then made an end run for a first down. After a six yard line plunge, a pass from Lafferty to Polk was completed. Port lost the ball to Manhasset on downs, and Manhasset, after two first downs, threw a forward which was intercepted by Lafferty. Then after an exchange of punts, Port fumbled the ball to Manhasset. Manhasset then punted to Port. Jenkins of Port then completed a pass.

In the fourth quarter, after two more exchanges of punts, Polk gained twenty-one yards on two end runs. Then a lateral pass from Terrell to DeMeo worked and DeMeo got away for the only touchdown of the game. Port again kicked off to Manhasset who made an aerial attack on Port. Out of six passes attempted, one was completed. The game ended with the ball in Manhasset's possession on their own fourteen yard line, after a punt by Port from the center of the field.
