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'Port Weekly' Ends Subscription Drive

Reports Prove Campaign Most Successful Is In School History

Terminating the most successful subscription campaign in the history of "The Port Weekly", Miss Helen Brock, Business Manager, and Miss Doris Fenton, Circulation Manager, were jubilant in being able to report that the goal of 800 subscriptions has been attained.

When asked what home room representatives had won the trophy award and which were eligible for receiving certificates of merit these two officials were agreed that unless all subscription money is recorded for an individual representative, he is not qualified for an award.

Alumni Add To Success

The campaign was launched this year with provision made for deferred subscription payments. A verbal contract between the representative and the individual was all that was necessary to receive "The Port Weekly." On October 7, however, the liberal credit period will expire, after which a student's subscription will cease if his total amount is not paid

Business men in Port Washington were induced to subscribe to the school paper this year by a provision whereby each was assured the delivery of the paper each week plus a bonus advertisement, one insertion of a one inch ad, for only ninety cents. This, together with the constantly growing alumni subscription list, has assured the success of the campaign.
