"Fighting Gentlemen" Fail To Score In Losing Second Game of Season By One Touchdown

The "Fighting Gentlemen" of Port High dropped another close decision on the gridiron last Saturday to a fiery Hicksville Eleven. The final score stood 7 to 0. Merrill Yarotzky tallied for the Orange and Black after his team had crashed through the Blue and White line and brought the pigskin to Port's own three yard stripe. Leonard's high but accurate place kick gave his team the extra point. This lone scoring occurred in the last quarter. Pete "One Man Team" Prudenti turned in an outstanding performance for the Blue and White with his powerful line plunges. He has had but one week of scrimmage due to a recent oper-

Douglas Rodgers' kick opened the game. A pass from Yarotzky to Mc-Innes netted Hicksville a first down, but they could get no further and punted. Rodgers immediately returned their punt, and with the ball in their possession, the Orange and Black boys gained another first down on Port's 10 yard line. Here Doug Rodgers recovered a Hicksville fumble and cancelled the scoring threat.

Hicksville Penalized

Pignataro opened the second period with a 19 yard run which was followed by a fumble. Bernie Mallon punted on the third down. Hicksville could do nothing, even though aided by a five yard penalty against Port. A fifteen yard penalty against the out-of-towners for unnecessary roughness gave Port a first down. At this point Bernie Mallon tossed a long pass, but it was intercepted by Engelbretzon. Smith, who went in for Pignataro, carried the ball for a 6 yard gain, but again Hicksville was set back by another fifteen yard penalty. With the ball once more in Port's hands, Pete made two ramrod line plunges for a net gain of 12 yards and a first down. Port was able to do no more, and thus the half ended in a scoreless tie.

The third quarter saw Swan go in for Mallon and "Lindy" Lamberti for Hooper. Both teams see-sawed back and forth until Swan was unlucky enough to fumble the ball on his own ten yard calcimine where Schluter of Hicksville recovered. Here McInnes, on a line crash, brought the pigskin to within one yard of a touchdown. However, on the very next down Leonard fumbled the football in an attempt to crash through right end. Mike Romeyko pounced on the elusive ball and saved the game for a while at least. "Duck" Swan booted it out of danger to end the period.

Brilliant Passes Tossed

Hicksville held the upper hand for nearly the entire final period, producing some brilliant passes and long end runs. Odd Hope, one of Port's husky linemen, outdid himself by grabbing Smith's right arm and practicaly throwing him to ground for a ten yard loss. In return the Orange and Black launched a pass which netted them 23 yards and a first down. From here on they could not be stopped and they marched on to a touchdown. Port's efforts to score in the final minutes of the game proved of no avail.

Two weeks ago the alumni barely nosed out the school team in an exciting clash. Although the older boys seemed to hold the upper hand for most of the fray, they were pressed back to their own three yard line in the last period. "Strap" Smith tallied for his side in the second frame for the only count of the game. This touchddown was expected sooner because of the Alumni's constant thrusts toward their goal.
