**Report Cards Stress** Effort and Attitude

Once more we are confronted with the problem of understanding our report cards and to help both pupils and parents we include this article by our principal.

The report card does not compare our work with that of our classmates; our marks will be the result of a competition against our own abilities. If we are doing good work, a check mark will appear in one column of our new reports; if we could do better and need to make a greater effort, that will be checked; if we have contributed actively to the success of our class and volunteered often in making our classwork profitable and interesting to all, our efforts will receive due credit on our cards by a check that appears in the column, "Effort or achievement worthy of praise."

#### Three Cards Each Term

Our new card will be issued three times a term. It is divided in two parts. The first part deals with our efforts and achievements in our classwork; and the second part with our social attitudes or citizenship, some times this is called "good "good sportsmanship." Both our teachers and parents agree that this is the more important part of our report. as, indeedg the most important thing in our lives is to be able to 'get along" with others and "play the game.

We usually forget how to decline a Latin noun or the formula for finding the volume of a sphere when we grow up but we all must learn. and practice self-control; and courtesy will help us in our school business and social lives; the world must progress and it can only be done through our own personal coopera-tion for the benefit of all; and industry and reliability are essential for our happiness and growth.

## **Attitudes Defined**

Reliability, Self-Control, Our Courtesy, Cooperation, and Industry are all to be marked and are very clearly defined in our new cards. An absence of a check mark by the teachers under these headings will mean that we have been unable to "get along" with others, both classmates and teachers in a socially acceptable manner. Sometimes this will mean that we must sacrifice a personal wish for the benefit of the entire group's welfare.

Sometimes we are improving or are slipping back in our work or citizenship. This will be shown by the use of a plus sign or minus sign in a column.

Our duty after we receive our cards is to see our teachers and ask for suggestions as to how to improve our records. A great deal of thought an dhard work has gone into the making of our cards. It is only fair to study ourselves each time we receive them and try to improve.


