Mr Johnson was pleased with the visits made by the parents and wishes to state the parents are always welcome in our school.



For these and many other reasons conected with units studied previ-ously, I honestly believe that Social Studies will have enabled me to become a better citizen by giving me a broader knowledge and understanding of conditions as they exist in the United States today.
