Glen Cove Became Port's Rival Back In 1917

Tomorrow afternoon Port High will terminate its 1937 gridiron season when the Blue and White Eleven encounters a superior Glen Cove aggregation. The game will be played at Glen Cove. This will be the "Fighting Gentlemen's" last opportunity to score this season.

The 1937 season has been one of the toughest ever completed by the "Costello Gridmen" in regard to injuries, "breaks" of the game, and scoring. The Glen Cove game is probably Port's most important encounter in view of traditional rivalry. This undiminished rivalry began back in 1917 when the two aggregations met for the first time. The standing of the two teams in regard to victories and defeats show the Red and Green have the edge. They have defeated Port thirteen times while the local boys have captured but nine. One game resulted in a tie.

Glen Cove boasts an excellent squad this year, having beaten Southampton and then drubbing Mineola. The Maroon of Mineola were, until they met Glen Cove, chief contenders for the North Shore cup. Last year, the Glen Cove boys downed the Blue and White on Seeber Field. Two years ago, however, Port subdued the Red and Orange amid a snowstorm and much excitement.

Two players who were injured at the opening of the season will probably see action against Glen Cove tomorrow. They are Bernie Mallon, Port Captain, who fractured a bone in his hand during the Hicksville battle; and Don Smith who suffered an injured knee in the Alumni tussle. Mike Romeyko who has been doing iron man work will again be seen in action. Pete Prudenti should also turn in his bit of ram rodding. Ted Gregory will be cavorting in the pivot position of the much missed Bob Woelfl.
