### Tuberculin Test For Ninth Grade

After the Christmas holidays the medical department in our schools is planning to give a tuberculin test to each member of the kindergarten, first, third, sixth, ninth, and twelfth grades. We wish to make you realize the necessity and importance of such a test, and to cooperate with us in having it done.

Boys and girls in their teens are the chief victims of tuberculosis, simply because they do not eat enough nourishing food, work and play too long and too hard, and rest too little.

One of the present methods employed to detect people whose bodies have been invaded by tuberculosis is a harmless skin test called the tuberculin test. If the test is positive, it is usually followed by a chest x-ray. It is this x-ray which decides whether the person has an active or inactive tuberculosis.

### Banking Lead Returns To 219 With 80% Mark

The banking lead this week swung back to Mr. Hulbert's 7B's in room 219. The percentage was 80% which means that four-fifths of the students in the room banked. Miss Mandigo's homeroom, 307, lost first place but came in second with 75.9%, less than five percentage points lower than room 219.
