High School: No doubt the caption of this brief article has a familiar sound to it, and I am sure you will pardon me if, for the pur-pose of capturing your attention, I have appropriated almost in its entirety the title of a picture that was shown at our motion picture theatre early in

I did not see the picture and so I do not know what relationship the title bore to the story, but at the instant I read the sign on the theatre the thought came to me: "Not only is it true that one cannot have everything but one cannot DO everything."

There are so many interesting activities here at school, in addition to the regular curriculum-music, dramatics, art, athletics and clubs,—that have a strong appeal to the average student. Not only do these ac-tivities take pretty much of the leisure time between the close of the afternoon session and the dinner hour, but they develop such an absorbing interest that the more prosaic subjects are likely to suffer from lack of necessary attention.

When you go to a restaurant for dinner, you do not, if you are wise, order everything on the menu. On the contrary, you select those dishes which appeal to you. So the wise student will decide which of the after-school activities has the greatest appeal. He will not waste his energy ineffectually in several directions, nor will he permit any one of these interests to monopolize all of his time.

The wise student will plan his daily and weekly work as carefully as he solves his problems in algebra or chemistry. He will make a schedule, give it a try, adopt it, and then stick to it. In this way he will be able to do many times as much as the slipshod and haphazard student. By planning his work, the wise student will not only find time for thorough study and mastery of that which he undertakes, but he will also find time for relaxation and happy companships.

High School Opens For Thirty-seventh Time In History Of Community

Three New Teachers Added to Faculty of Senior High School; Miss Sammis Returns to School After Sabbatical Leave

The Senior High School opened for the thirty-seventh year in the history of Port Washington on Sepember 8 at one o'clock. The opening of school inaugurates the ninth year in the new high school building. The school year of 1937-1938 is the sixteenth that Mr. Merrill has been in

charge and the twentieth that Mr. Schrieber, superintendent, has been **Ends Leave** in Port Washington.

Mr. Merrill welcomed the students in the high school auditorium and gave instructions to sophomores and new pupils as well as to direct students to their new home rooms.

Add to Faculty

There have been several new additions to the faculty. Miss Saberski came from Highland Manor, where she taught Spanish, to take the place of Mr. R. Predmore. In June, Mr. Predmore accepted a position to teach at Rutgers University. Miss Mac Guillvary, who has taught in Riverhead High School and is a graduate of Port Washington High School, is to take the place of Miss A. Gormley. Upon the resignation of Miss C. Deane, Miss Josephine Work has come from Chicago to teach commercial subjects. Miss Catherine Sammis also returned to the high school after having studied at Columbia Unviersity during her Sabbatical leave last year. To take the place of Miss Anne Chishoim, Miss Angela Mallon has been employed to teach English. Miss Mallon aught English in the Junior High school and is also a graduate of the Port Washington School System.

The marking system for the com-ing year has been changed in one particular. The marks for the previous year were H(honor work), S(satisfactory work), and U(unsatisfactory work). This year there will be S plus and S minus added to the system to enable teachers to mark more fairly. The change was made at the request of the teachers and parents of the students.

Introduce New Subject

A new subject, salesmanship, has been added to the courses of the school. This subject was added to make it possible for commercial students to get a diploma in gen-eral business. Up to this time, only stenographical and bookkeeping diplomas have been available to commercial students. Mr. Edward Dodds will teach salesmanship. A course in business management is under discussion as a possbile subject to be added in January. The course in economic problems, originated by lbMiss Sammis, will again be offered with her return to the school. Glee Clubs and mixed chorus, under the supervision of Mr. Van Bodegraven, during the fifth period instead of after school, as it was the previous year. Mr. Van Bodegraven is also having mixed chorus on Thursday afternoon after school. Beginning this year, band and or-chestra members will receive a half unit of credit a year for their work.
