

Port Quintet Meets Glen Cove Tonight

Rooters See Port Defeat Manhasset Friday

Tonight the Port High Basketball squad will play host to the Green and Red Courtmen of Glen Cove. It will be Port's second league game of the season. Glen Cove has always been an intense rival of the Blue and White and never fails to produce a threat to the North Shore championship. Last year Port and Glen Cove split even in their two games series, with each aggregation winning on their home courts.

Port's lineup for tonight will undoubtedly be "Mac" McCarthy and Tony Augustino, forwards; Don Smith, center; and "Pussy" Markland and Mike Romeyko, guards. "Mac", who performed so well in the Manhasset game last week, will be in the spotlight tonight. The Blue and White Quintet have so far taken four out of five games and are in a confident mood in regard to the Glen Cove contest tonight. Mineola's Maroons and the Covers are Port's two toughest foes; and, if Port can triumph tonight, it will be in fair position to compete for the championship.

Many Rooters Attend

A very large number of Port rooters appeared at Manhasset last week to witness their team's victory; therefore, an even larger crowd should come to the Port gym tonight.

Last Friday night, the Port High Quintet travelled to Manhasset and defeated the Town Hallers in a league game, 20 to 18. As the score indicates, it was an extremely fast and exciting contest. "Mac" McCarthy stole the show for the evening by gaining a total of ten points for his squad. It was "Mac's" flashy playing and timely shooting that kept his team from going down to defeat. Grik and Contino were next high scorers of the game with six points apiece. Port's airtight defense had the Manhasset boys baffled many times during the evening.

Manhasset Leads

Manhasset drew first blood in the game and continued to pile up a fairly good lead over Port who was slow in getting started. In the second period, however, the Blue and White boys got their eye on the basket and scored enough points to lead Manhasset 11 to 10, at the half.

The second half of the game saw the lead see-saw back and forth. Several times the two teams were deadlocked in a tie. With but a few minutes to play the score stood 17 all and bedlam broke loose in Manhasset's well lighted gym. "Mac" McCarthy, who was fouled, in taking his free shot was successful, much to the joy of Port's rooters. "Mac" followed this by sinking the sphere for the last tally of the game. Thus, the local boys won their fourth game of the five they have taken part in.

N. Y. U. Announces Mid-Year Division

The stumbling block of graduation from high school in February and thereby being forced to wait until September before entering college need not bother boys and girls who will receive their diplomas next month.

Provost Rufus D. Smith, acting dean of the New York University Washington Square College, pointed out in an interview today that the College has organized a February-September Division to meet the needs of these students.

"The New York City school system, unlike many others, provides for graduation at different times," Provost Smith said. "In February the high schools of the metropolitan area graduate a large group of seniors who ordinarily would have to wait until September before they find it possible to begin college."

"The February-September Division of Washington Square College makes it possible for seniors to begin their college work at once and to complete most of the requirements of the freshman year by September. In this way a full year is saved in a student's academic life, and the September following this February graduation marks the beginning of his sophomore year. Likewise the summer session of the Washington Square College is set up so that graduates in June can begin on their college work at once, thus making it possible, with the proper use of other summers, to shorten their academic years by a year.

"The Washington Square College has geared its curriculum to meet the needs of students graduating at different times."

While the major portion of the students are in assembly this afternoon listening to a program featuring Mr. Stuart Gracey, popular radio soloist, fifty students will be enroute to Roslyn in the school buses to attend a three o'clock performance of Bernard Shaw's "Pygmalion" as guests of the Federal Theatre.
