The events will be in the following order: 100 yd. dash, jr. trials; 100 yd. dash, senior trials; 880 yd. run, final; senior high jump; jr. shot put, ir high jump; senior run, final; senior high jump; jr. shot put; jr. high jump; senior shot put; 100 yd. dash; jr. final 100 yd. dash; senior final pole vault; jr. running broad jump; 220 dash, jr. and senior trials; 440 dash, final; senior running broad jump; 220 yd. dash, jr. and senior finals; mile run final; 880 relay finals; mile run, final; 880 relay, Jr and senior final. The team placing first gets 5 points; 2nd, 3 points; 3rd, 2 points; 4th, 1 point. Last year at Westbury, West-

bury wen with 201/2 points. Hicksville and Port Washington tied for second, each getting 29 points. In the Port Invitation meet this year, Hicksville got 44 points and Port placed second with 34 points. In the Hicksville-Port Dual, we were only 3 points behind.
