

Port Team Is Second To Hicksville In Annual North Shore Track Meet

Morrison Stars For Port With Two Firsts As Effertz And McKenna Take One Apiece

Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock the Port Washington High School acted as host to the Twentieth Annual North Shore Track Meet at Seeber Field. Hicksville repeated its triumph of several weeks before and carried off top honors by the score of 42½ to the nearest opponent to Port's 31½.

Kenneth Morrison and Billy Effertz were in their usual form, Kenneth coming through with a first in the Jr. century, and 220 yard dash. Bill led the field in the Senior 220 yard dash.

The closest Port came to breaking a record was McKenna's performance in the junior 8 lb. shot put when he came a half inch from the record of 44 ft. 9 in.

Hicksville showed the consistently high calibre of its team by winning the twelve lb. shot put, the broad jump, and the relays. Their senior relay team broke the record made in 1937 by one and two tenths seconds.

Kenny Morrison swept aside his old record of ten and six tenths seconds in the junior hundred and won in ten and two tenths seconds.

The Port fans' biggest thrill came in the junior 880 yard relay when the team of Wanzer, Rice, Stephenson, and Young were barely nosed out in a tight finish by the Hicksville Quartet.

The teams which entered were Farmingdale, Glen Cove, Great Neck, Hicksville, Mineola, Roslyn, Sea Cliff, Westbury, Oyster Bay, and Port Washington.

Nassau Track Meet To Be Held In Port June 4, Is Present Date For Track Encounter

An unusual event will be accorded to the Port Washington Senior High school when the annual Nassau County Track meet is held here on June 4, 1938 at Seeber Field with the finals beginning at 2:00 P. M. This honor has never been given to our school before although many other schools have held it.

The meet is unusual in the fact that three of the events will be run in the morning. These are the 440 yd., the 220 yd., and the 880 yd. trials. The other events will be staged as usual.

Historic Seeber Field has been the scene of several major encounters this spring. The series began with the Twentieth Annual Invitation Track Meet, held here on May 17. Next came the Tenth Annual North Shore Track Meet held last Saturday. Also on the list have been the Glen Cove Dual Meet, and the Farmingdale Dual. In the two big meets, Hicksville walked away with first honors with Port a close second. Port will be out fighting in full strength for high honors and first place.

The events will be as follows: the 100 yd. dash, Jr. trials and Sr. trials; then the 880 yd. final; 100 yd. dash, Jr. and Sr. finals; 220 yd. dash, Jr. and Sr. trials; 440 dash final; 880 Jr. and Sr. finals. Meanwhile on the field, the Jr. and Sr. pole vault, Jr. and Sr. shot put; Jr. and Sr. high jump and running broad jump will be in progress.

The girls made all the hats displayed in the show, and the flowers for the flower wagon were contributed by the rest of the French students.


Retort Votes in New Members

Bert Shauer held the Town Hallers in check to end the game and thus Port carried home its fifth League win of the season. The Blue and White are now League leaders with 5 wins and two reverses.

Port Nine Loses Roslyn Encounter

Second League Loss of Season Costs Lead

Last Friday Port dropped its second league baseball encounter to a vengeful Roslyn nine. The final tally was 10 to 3. Port received back some of the rough treatment they handed to Roslyn two weeks ago when they swamped them 21 to 8. Bert Schauer did the hurling for Port and is charged with the loss. Joe Calo received credit for the victory.

Both Teams Score Roslyn got off to a fast start when they scored three times in the first inning. Port came right back, however, and pushed an equal number of runs over the plate. That, however, was the extent of the tallying by the local athletes for that afternoon.

Catcher Belcastro of the Roslyn nine made the longest hit of the day when he poled a triple over Don Harshberger's head in left field. Two new faces were to be seen in Port's lineup. Due to the absence of Alan Gould, Port's regular third baseman, Pussy Markland took over the hot corner and performed fairly well. Will Baker, who has been doing an excellent job of handling first base, was relieved in the fourth inning by Henry Hay, a newcomer to Port's ranks. Hay was on the spot and had to look good, which he succeeded in doing.

Three Way Tie Glen Cove's defeat of Mineola the same day saved the Blue and White from dropping out of a tie for first place. Roslyn also shares a place in the three way tie and the remaining games should see a hard fought battle to decide who comes out on top.

Last Tuesday Port faced Manhasset and today they will attempt to defeat the Glen Covers again in the final league game of the season. Another post office game is scheduled for sometime next week.
