Council Holds Open Hearing

LAST TUESDAY AN OPEN SESSION OF THE STUDENT COUNCIL WAS HELD AFTER SCHOOL IN THE AUDITORIUM, TO AFFORD THE STUDENT BODY AN OPPORTUNITY TO PROPOSE CHANGES IN THE DRAFT OF THE G.O. CONSTITUTION. IN SPITE OF THE FACT THAT ONLY A HANDFUL OF STUDENTS ATTENDED, THERE WAS A VERY LIVELY DISCUSSION.

JOHN SCHAEFFER GAVE INSTRUCTIONS AS TO HOW THE DISCUSSION WAS TO BE REGULATED, AND THEN THE MEETING WAS PROCEEDED WITH.

HOWARD STEPHENSON INTRODUCED A THREE POINT PROGRAM DESIGNED TO CLARIFY THE POWERS OF THE STUDENT COUNCIL OVER THE CLUBS OF THE SCHOOL. THESE SUGGESTIONS HAD BEEN MADE UP BY THE PRESIDENTS OF SIX CLUBS AND THE PRESIDENTS OF THE JUNIOR AND SENIOR CLASSES WORKING TOGETHER.

THEN BUD MCQUADE SUBMITTED A 22 POINT SUGGESTION WHICH WAS ALSO DESIGNED TO LIMIT AND CLARIFY THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE G.O. AND THE STUDENT COUNCIL. HIS MOST INTERESTING SUGGESTION REFERRED TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A SEPARATE BODY TO ACT AS A SUPREME COURT, IN THE CASE OF QUESTIONS CONCERNING THE POWERS ALLOWED THE COUNCIL.

ALL THE SUGGESTIONS SUBMITTED HAVE BEEN DISCUSSED BY THE STUDENT COUNCIL AT THE MEETING HELD AFTER SCHOOL YESTERDAY, AND THEY WILL BE FURTHER DISCUSSED AT THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE COUNCIL DURING THE FIRST PERIOD ON NEXT TUESDAY. IF ANYBODY HAS ANY IDEAS FOR THE BETTERMENT OF THE CONSTITUTION, THEY ARE REQUESTED TO COMMUNICATE THEM TO THEIR COUNCIL MEMBER IMMEDIATELY.

WHEN THE COUNCIL HAS FINISHED ITS DISCUSSIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION A FINAL DRAFT WILL BE SUBMITTED TO THE STUDENTS FOR RATIFICATION. THIS WILL BE IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

Seniors To Throw Tea Dance

NEXT TUESDAY, APRIL 16TH, THE SENIOR CLASS WILL PRESENT A TEA DANCE FOR THE STUDENTS OF THE SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL. THIS WILL BE THE FIRST EVENT OF THIS KIND TO BE PRESENTED THIS YEAR, AND THE RADIO PHONOGRAPH COMBINATION WILL BE UTILIZED FOR MUSIC.
