## Adult Education Classes Start Tuesday, Feb. 11

The Board of Education is to sponsor a series of adult education classes in the future, it has been announced. Registration will take place for the second time on Tuesday, February 11, at 8:00 p. m., in the senior high school.

Classes will start about the middle of this month, and will be offered in oil painting, freehand drawing, mechanical drawing, type-writing, shorthand, home economics, woodworking, leather work, art metal work, jewelry, plaster casting, French, German, economics, Spanish, biology, history, civics, Americanization, and mathematics.

A nominal fee will be charged, and there will be a total of 15 hours of instruction in each subject.

In certain instances, day school students will be permitted to take courses, but each individual case must receive approval from the principal. Action will be based upon the value of the work to the student, and it must be remembered that the fee for these classes is far from enough to cover their cost.

Sparked by "Cosmo" Morrison, Port Washington took another step toward the North Shore basketball championship when they handed Garden City a 37 to 27 set-back at the Senior High gym last Friday night.

The game was bitterly contested but Port's fine defensive play and passing were decisive factors.

Diminutive "Cosmo" Morrison led the victors with 13 points, while Dan Somers tallied 15 for Garden City.

Through the fine shooting of Harold Kelly and Morrison, Port rolled up an early lead and left the floor at the half leading 20 to 11. Garden City, due to the effective zone defense employed by Port Washington, was unable to get in close for lay-up shots and had to rely on long set-shots.

Throughout the second half Port maintained its commanding lead and although Garden City improved in its shooting the visitors were unable to cope with the home team's aggressive play.

With McKenna and Morrison continuing their sensational shooting and Andy Jessen and Ray Elliot taking rebounds off the back-board the blue and white stretched their lead to 28 to 17 at the end of the third period.

Last Friday night to the accompaniment of frenzied cheers, Port's second team dropped a close game 31 to 27 to a smoothly working Garden City aggregation. Working the ball around smoothly and exhibiting a tight defense the visitors had the game well under control in the first half.

Sinking many long field goals, Garden City displayed some excellent marksmanship and also a deadly passing attack which more than once proved disastrous to Port.

The starting Port five, and one that remained virtually intact throughout the rest of the game, consisted of Chris Santinello, Tony Natale, "Buddy" Veit, Pete Mighietta, and Jerry D'Augustino.

The game went into overtime and in the last few seconds of play Garden City put in two timely goals.

We would like to extend a little credit to our student body for their vastly improved conduct at last week's game. The only noise made while foul shots were being taken was caused by the visiting cheering section and non-scholastic members of the audience. Though it may be no more than coincidence, the players seemed much less strained and the play itself was very clean.
