With the record ban now just about over, we were expecting something unusual in the line of records. The discs which have been issued since the ban, however, have been unusual only in the sense that they have been unusually bad.

Best of the poor bunch is "Pistol Packin' Mamma" with Bing Crosby and the Andrews sisters. Bing kicks the tune around with his usual sense of humor but otherwise the disc is without distinction.

Capitol's version of the same tune is done by the Pied Pipers with a backing by Paul Weston's house orchestra. The only claim to fame that this platter could have is the fact that Jo Stafford is the feeminine member of the Pipers. Both of these discs are over-arranged if you want another reason for not buying them.

The third post-ban record is also "Pistol Packin' Mamma" and is even done worse than the other two. It's done by Freddy "Schnickelfritz" Fisher and his corn band.

Just to show that we are not entirely pessimistic, we'll rave about a couple of the bands around N. Y. C. Lionel Hampton's crew at the famous door is the talk of the town. It's the most rhythmatically exciting band to hit town in years.

While we're talking about rhythm, we'll say something about the solid rhythm section at the Benny Goodman band at New Yorker. In case you haven't heard, Gene Krupa is back behind the tubs and the rest of the section is made up of veteran men, who all have been with Benny at one time or another.
