JACKSON LEADS PORT

On Saturday, October 17th, a very energetic Ernie Jackson lead the Blue and White eleven to a 31-0 victory over a weak Westbury team. In the first period Westbury found success in hitting the Port line and threatened in the opening minutes of the ball game. The Costellomen lead by Jackson, were not to be caught off guard, however, and they seemingly held the Westbury team cold blank the rest of the game, as the varsity lead the way for the entire Port squad to see action during the game.

Port's scoring was lead off by Jackson as he tallied on a thirty yard run for the first Port tally in the opening period. Later in the second quarter Port's triple threat back showed his ability when he passed to other Port players for two more Port tallies. The first went into the end zone and was snared by capable end, Gordy Meyer, and the second was taken by Paul Boehme on the Westbury two yard line, with Boehme plowing over the goal line for the tally. Fumbles seemed to be Port's specialty today, as Dave Cutler recovered one. Late in the third quarter, Jackson, who was having a fine day for himself, recovered a Westbury fumble and scooted thirty-three precious yards for Port's fourth tally. The final Blue and White score came in the last quarter on a pass play to junior class representatives to this year's varsity, covering thirty yards. It was passed from Bob Dohm and caught in the end zone by George Palaski. At this Point Port had not made a point after touchdown in previous games this season, but capable Bob Dohm broke the spell, and made the score thirty-one to nothing, a well deserved victory for the Costellomen.

PORT TROUNCES OCEANSIDE

Oceanside averted a washout by scoring on a pass play covering sixty-five yards, from Havasta to Houghton. The try for the extra point failed. Again today Port missed the extra points!!
