On December 4, the American Legion Forum will be presented in P.D.S.H.S.

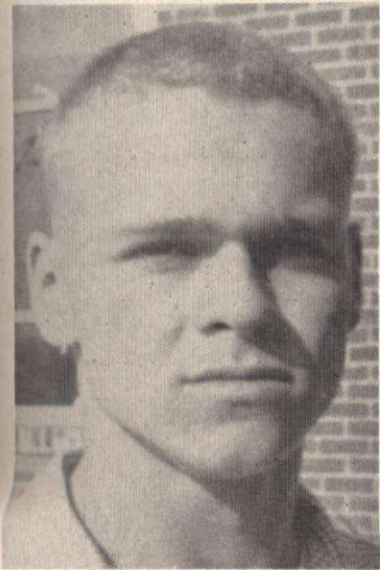
