More Discipline Is Discussed By G.O.



It was Port's outstanding singles team of Bill Brown, George Girardin and John Foster that kept the team in contention throughout the race. Avars Krasts and Arthur Nodine also turned in impressive matches.

The team compiled an 8 and 5 record, beating Manhasset, Farmingdale and Glen Cove twice, Sea Cliff once and splitting two games with Roslyn.
They lost twice to the league's
two leading teams, Great Neck
