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# Johnson Attends Meetings At R.P.I.

Mrs. Johnson represented P.-D.S.H.S. at the Industry and Education Convention at Renselaer Polytechnic Institute last week. There were 605 teachers from the U.S.A.

The purpose of the convention was to transmit to the teachers the aspects and prerequisites of industrial work.

The presidents of many of the leading industrial companies at-tended the convention to talk and answer questions.
