## Rules Of Eligibility Govern Activities

The eligibility rules require that any pupil who fails to earn at least an S average in attitude marks during any marking period in each of four units of work shall be ineligible to participate in extra-curricular activities including athletics, dramatics, publications, and music - in other words, anything other than regular scheduled class work.

Any pupil who is ineligible may become eligible for a week at a time by bringing his attitude marks in four units of work up to at least an S in each subject. This shall be determined by a weekly report which the students must obtain from the principal's office and have filled out by all of his teachers on Monday for the preceding week. Pupils must follow this same procedure each succeeding week of of the marking period if the pupil desires to be eligible.
