John Spainer, friend and companion of Bob Smithdas, gave Bob's life story before introducing him to the assembly.

Bob Smithdas, 27, was left totally deaf and blind at the age of five when he was stricken by spinal meningitis. Bob was the first deaf blind person since Helen Keller, 50 years ago, to earn a college degree. In 1950, Bob graduated from St. John's University, Brooklyn, in June 1950, and received his Bachelor of Arts, Cum Laude. He was a member of the St. John's wrestling team and is a qualified Red Cross swimmer.
