Port's 23rd Annual Concert 'The Lion And The Lamb' Reign Tomorrow Night Is Sell Out At Sophomore Dance Tonight

Under the direction of Mr. George Christopher, the Port Washington High School Band will present their twenty-third Annual Concert tomorrow night 8:30. This event, which promises to be a sell-out will be held in the Paul D. Schreiber High School Auditorium.

All alumni of this group have been invited to come and bring their instruments.

A wide variety of selections will be played for the public at this concert. Through a great deal of planning, the program will present similar numbers with the same tempos and interest groups that it has been presenting for years.

Opening the program, the band will play the "National Anthem" by Francis Scott Key. Following will be "His Honor" by Henry Fillmore, Bach's "If Thou Be Near," "La Boheme" by Puccini, Tchaikowsky's "Marche Slave," the introduction to the third act of "Lohengrin" by Wagner, which will be followed by a brief intermission. The second half of the evening's entertainment will begin with "Del Ray" by O'Caneva, followed by Richard Wright's "Overture from Kismet," "Perpetuum Mobile" by Johann Strauss, Cailliet's "Pop Goes the Weasel," and "Third Street Rhumba" by Clifford Shaw. Terminating the evening will be three popular marches, "Indiana State Band," "High School Cadets" and "Stars and Stripes Forever."

Featured on the program will be a tuba solo by Riggy Wile. He will play the first movement of the "Second Concerto" by Ernest Williams. "Etude Caprice" by Moslowski will be played as
