Committee Revises G. O. Constitution

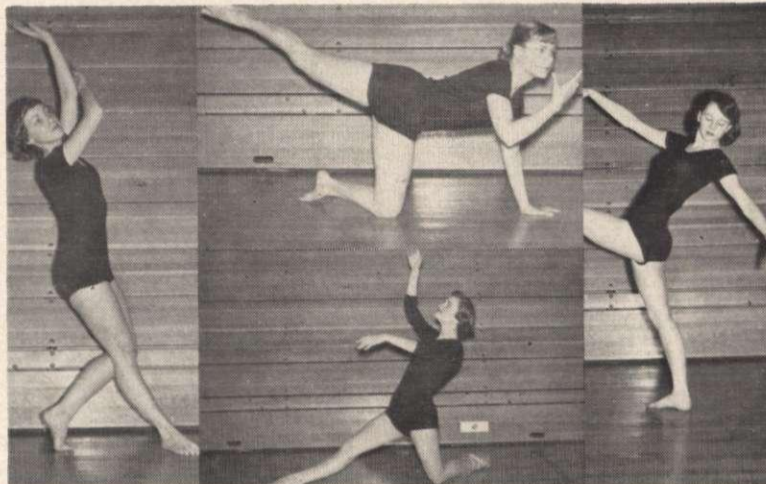
