Port Downs Covers

In their first dual meet of the season, on the losers' cinders, coach Costello's trackmen defeated Glen Cove, 57 - 47, May 5. Outscoring the Covers 5 - 2 in the running events, Port failed to pick up first places in the field events, with the exception of the high jump and a tie for first in the pole vault.

Bill Brown, Jay Purdy, and George Ribar lead Port in doubles, with firsts in the high jump, the 220-yd. dash and the mile, and then placing second in the broad jump, the 100-yd. dash and the discus, respectively.

Other firsts were in the 440-yd. dash by Norman Taylor, in the 180-yd. dash low - hurdles by Al DeMeo and in the pole vault where Matthew Seddon tied for first.

Bob Slusser took third in the hundred and second in the 220. Blakeslee came in second in the 880-yd. run and was followed by Bob Hansen, third. Ray Sautler and Johnson placed third in the broad jump and the mile. Joe Dell and John Schermerhorn took two, three in the shot put; and DeMeo, Dykes, Slusser and Purdy won the 880 relay to conclude Port's victory.

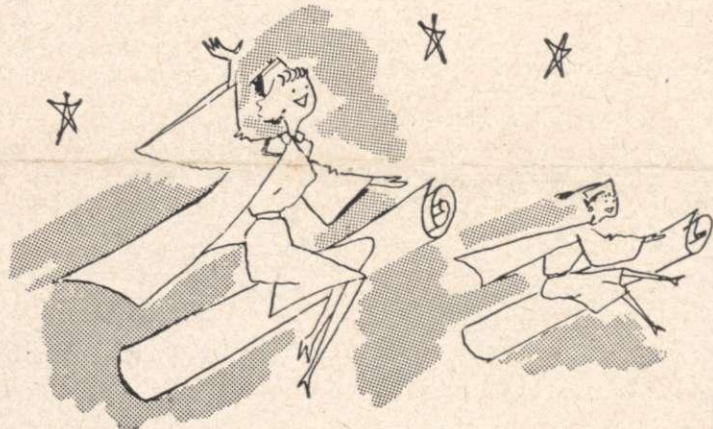
