### Election Highlights Evening

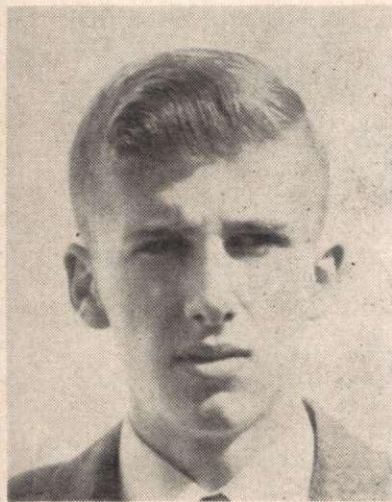

### Gridiron Men Get In Trim

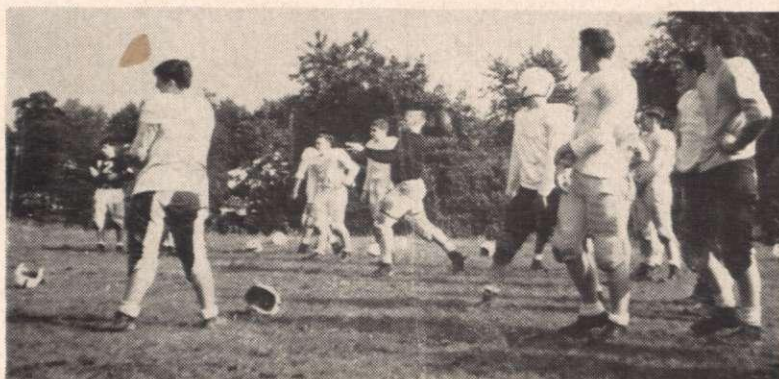

### G.O. Ticket Goal: 100 Per Cent Sales

One hundred percent is the G.O.'s goal in the sale of G. O. tickets in all classes this year. Sales began on September 14, when students who desired tickets, signed slips entitling them to G.O.'s

This year the ticket will provide half price admission to the three home football games, all home basketball games, discounts at various Port stores, and a subscription to the Port Weekly. More than five dollars will be saved throughout the school year by buying a G.O.

Ray Sauter, PDSHS treasurer, pointed out that discounts may be obtained at fifteen stores. Some of the stores are B. and L. Athletic, Chester's Highway Garage, Vanity Fair Beauty Salon, Lawrence Shoe Shop, Straub Music Center, the Alcove, Port Flower Shop, Eastern Camera Exchange, Marsh Appliance Center, Port Electric, Newmark Artist Supplies, and Beacon Bootery.

The money obtained from the ticket sales is the only means of supporting the G.O., besides paying for the special assemblies held during the year.
