PDS Discourages Jeans For Students

Paul D. Schreiber High School is among the most recent public schools to discourage dungarees. The school's main objection to the jeans is that they are sloppy, but teachers also contend that they adversely influence the be-havior of the students.

The jeans are as near to a school uniform as most American public schools have gotten; more than one-half of the boys wear them at some schools.
