PDSHS Sponsors Visit of Student From Foreign Country Thru A. F. S.

Perhaps you have heard that PDSHS is planning to entertain a foreign student next year. Many students must remember Terry Taneda from last year. Two of this year's senior girls were chosen to go to Europe last summer under the American Service Student Exchange Program; Susan Riley visited Austria and Kay Marbut stayed in Germany.

What is the American Field Service? It is a private, non-profit, educational organization whose purpose is the furthering of understanding and goodwill among the peoples of the world. It carries out this purpose by bringing teenage students from abroad to study in American high schools and preparatory schools and live in American families and communities for a year. During the summer, AFS sends a group of American teen-agers to Europe to live in families abroad.

The American Field Service was founded in 1914 as a volunteer ambulance corps and served with the allied forces in both World War I and World War II. Its 4,000 volunteer members carried over a million casualties. The AFS peacetime program of international exchange on the teen-age level was founded in 1947; the Summer Program in 1950.

The homes in Europe are found by volunteer American Field Service committees which are made up of AFS "returnees." (Returnees are those students who have studied in the U.S. for a year under AFS scholarships and returned home.) The existence of the Summer Program is due to the returnees' belief in the good of international exchange on the teen-age level and their efforts to further it. They not only find the homes, but are in charge of the placement of students in the homes. They also act as official hosts. The committees are helped by AFS offices in Paris, France, Duesseldorf, Germany, and Bruxelles, Belgium.

The host families may be those of returnees, or of their friends, or of interested persons in the community. All are carefully screened. All offer their hospitality through their belief in the purposes of the program. Families do not receive any financial assist-

Travel arrangements are made by AFS in New York. Round trip ocean transportation is arranged on student ships. This year the participating countries are: Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Great Britain, Greece, Italy, Japan, Luxembourg, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and Turkey.

Eligibility is dependent on the candidate's age (he or she must be at least 16), a member in good standing of the student body of the school which is participating in the AFS program during the last two academic years, a member of the junior class, and in good health.

Next year's visitor to Port Washington will stay with Janet and Nancy Wittman. The country from which the visitor will come has not yet been determined. The \$650 that is needed for us to sponsor this exchange has been donated by community and school organizations. At the end of the school year, the foreigners tour our country.
