## Schreiber Makes State Top Ten

Schreiber High School has been named as one of New York State's 10 finalists in the National Secondary School Recognition Program (N.S.S.R.P.) Schreiber was the only school from Nassau honored this year, and only the third school in the county (Great Neck North and Roslyn are the others) ever to be cited.

The N.S.S.R.P. is a national program and to become involved Schreiber's administrators had to compile a 20 page application. This document featured a detailed description of Schreiber's assets: statistics demonstrated our school's excellent performance on the SAT's and the National Merit Competition; reports highlighted Schreiber's many and varied extra-curricular activities; another section featured the credentials and recognition of our faculty; a list of the more than 200 courses offered here was included, as were attendance and disciplinary records.

Just being chosen to participate in the program was an honor for Schreiber. Former Secretary of Education Terrell Bell sent letters to the Commissioner of Education from each of the 50 states. The commissioner's office then chose certain schools, those they deemed most qualified, to participate in the program. New

York's school's applications were looked over by a panel of teachers and administrators from the state. The applications were coded by number to insure confidentiality. The panel chose 10 schools, just two from Long Island, to continue the program on a national level.

The applications of all 500 finalist schools will be judged by a national panel. Those judged outstanding by the panel will be given national recognition. This is not a competition with a limited number of awards, in fact, the national committee can give out an unlimited number of awards.

## Fein, Mann and Schuldner Named NCTE Finalists

Schreiber's three winners of the National Council of Teachers of English writing contest are Michael Fein, Jessica Mann, and Ed Schuldner. The contest, which is composed of two essays, was judged by a committee of English teachers who "had trouble eliminating some of the essays this year because so many were so good."

The first essay asked that the students write about the quality of life that they would like to lead, and asked them to use two literary examples. Michael Fein chose 1984 by George Orwell and *Brave New World* by Aldus Huxley as two examples of how some modern advancements are destroying our quality of life; he wrote that he would prefer to live off the land, like the characters in John Steinbeck's *Of Mice and Men*. Ed Schuldner also

stressed "getting back to nature" in his essay, using *Of Mice and Men* and *The Fellowship of the Ring* by J.R.R. Tolkien as examples. Jessica Mann cited the plays *Pippin* and *Vanities* as illustrations that you should "try everything that comes your way" and "not close yourself off to opportunities."

The second essay required of the competitors was a creative work written any time during their high school career. Jessica submitted a poem entitled "Green Turned to Brown" which was strongly influenced by her impressions of *The Grapes of Wrath* by John Steinbeck. An original short story about a computer that could predict the outcome of horse races was Mike's entry. Edward wrote a short story in the style of Edgar Allan Poe, "The Crimson Portal."

## VANITIES Bolstered By Both Casts

"...There's so much to think about—boyfriends, sororities..." so says Kathy, one of the high school cheerleaders depicted in Act 1 of Vanities. Through four performances the two casts - each consisting of three actresses - helped broadcast the message that boyfriends and sororities do not guarantee happiness in later life.

The play follows the lives of three women; showing them first as carefree high school cheerleaders, whose first worry, upon hearing of President Kennedy's death, is whether the football game will go on; then as college seniors, becoming more aware that life is not all happy endings and pep rallies; and finally as grown women, one as a housewife with three kids and a drinking problem, one as a lonely, unemployed gym teacher, and one as the owner of a gallery specializing in erotic art. The first act of the play is comedy, but the play quickly becomes serious, leading to a real downer of an ending.

Both of the three-actress casts—one consisting of Erica Kane, Rachel Singer, and Lauren Rosenblum, the other Anne Martin, Ann Richman, and Carole McDonald—gave exceptionally good performances, marred somewhat by Texas accents which reminded of Vicki Lawrence in "Mama's Family." This small detail, however, did little to detract from the talent displayed. Erica Kane, as the "sexed-up", sarcastic Mary, and Carole McDonald as the naive Joanne, who wants nothing more than a husband and children, were particularly good. Kane, who was required to say such lines as, "Jim, keep it in your pants," seemed completely uninhibited throughout the play, and when her part called for her to be a bitch, she played it to the hilt. McDonald made the naive and innocence which make up Joanne's personality completely believable.

Rachel Singer and Anne Martin were both properly peppy in the role of Kathy, the head-cheerleader turned gym teacher turned nothing. Martin was especially lively, and both actresses made the most of the role's humor. Ann Richman, as Mary, seemed more sure of her lines, then did Kane, although she did not seem quite as comfortable in the role. Lauren Rosenblum, as Joanne, seemed nervous while acting, but nevertheless gave quite a

respectable performance.

An interesting feature of this play are the Entr' Actes. The actresses don't leave the stage between acts, but change their clothing and fix their make-up and hair in front of the audience. While interesting at first, the novelty of this practice soon wore off and by the third of these Entr' Actes there was an audible level of conversation in the auditorium. The actresses kept their cool, however, and continued to look almost professional. Lauren Rosenblum, in particular, seemed to relax during these Entr' Actes, and was good at looking natural while getting dressed in front of a live audience.

There were notable differences in the acting of the two casts. McDonald, Richman, and Martin seemed much closer on stage than did the other cast; it was easy to believe that they were best friends. The final act, in which an emotional showdown occurs between Mary and Joanne, was made very emotional by McDonald, Martin, and Richman; one could feel the tension onstage. Kane, Singer, and Rosenblum made more of the act's humor and less of its seriousness; one left after their performance feeling less depressed than after the other cast's performance. There were differences in the individual character interpretations. Rosenblum's Joanne was more pitiable than was McDonald's, and Richman's Mary was less condescending and more indifferent than was Kane's. While Martin's Kathy was somewhat more spirited than Singer's, Kathy's character remained fairly consistent through all the performances.

The show's costumes were very well chosen; they showed clearly the differences between the characters' personalities. Joanne looked prim and proper, Mary looked somewhat risqué, and Kathy looked more athletic and less feminine than the other two. The music played during the Entr' Actes was all chosen so as to be significant; it was all performed by women, and such songs as "I Heard it Through the Grapevine," "Where did Our Love Go?," "Will You Love Me Tomorrow?," and others provided foreshadowing of the dramatic events to come.

Although they played to relatively small audiences, all six actresses turned out emotional, enjoyable performances. Those who missed this play did indeed miss something worthwhile.

The main controversy of the by-laws was how to determine membership in the Youth Council. Until now it has been a loose policy. The committee formed regarding this issue consists of Rob Hallock, Shelley Turteltaub, Dr. Berkowitz, Jessica Mann, Phyllis Josephs, David Fried, Hope Hallock, and Suzanne Ponzoni. They are to report at the next meeting.

The Youth Council decided to buy an insurance policy for the group sponsored activities. On February 8th, the movie "Mash" was shown at the Masonic Lodge (the Youth-Adult Center). John Micheal Marino Lodge, Sons of Italy offered to donate food for this event.

Safe Rides reported that everything was going well. The Youth Employment Service reported that they were having trouble because of their new location. It is thought that the lull in student interest, coupled with the new location of the Y.E.S. office in Mr. Costello's office, has made the group's efforts less effective.

Celebration was also discussed. David Fried, representing a student committee,

reported that main problem is that students' parties center around drinking, and this party atmosphere is brought into school at any possible occasion (before every holiday). The committee formed regarding this problem was made up of Bob Schanzer, Jane Schwartz, Adam Lane, Val Ullman, Doug Haar, Virgil Zirpola Sr., Annabel Scheinberg, and Reverend Kurt Von Roeschlaub.

An apprentice program for the unions was mentioned, too. This problem is for students who don't plan to go to college and wish to be apprentices. A summer program paid for by the Youth Council was also discussed. Kay Ullman and Faith Cleary were put in charge of the selection of people for this program. The selection procedure will be reported at the next meeting. The treasurer's report essentially stated that the Youth Council is not bankrupt. The last issue discussed was the Community Development Funding. The requirements for receiving this funding is that 51% of the participants in the sponsored activity must be minority or low income people. A committee was formed to determine what activity, if any, would meet these requirements. It consists of Reverend Randy Page, Phyllis Josephs, Regina Farinaccio, and Reverend Von Roeschlaub. The meeting was then closed.

## Schreiber Sophomore Wins Less Than Nobel, More Than Merit

Andrew Frutkin, a sophomore at Schreiber, has been named as one of 12 finalists to be awarded the Thomas Alva Edison/Max McGraw Scholarship. The finalists were chosen out of 25 semi-finalists from the United States, Canada, West Germany, Italy, and Japan. Five of the finalists met in Orlando Florida on January 28 to be interviewed by the National Judging Committee. At this time two of the twelve were selected to each receive a five thousand dollar scholarship and an all expense paid trip to Taiwan this spring as the Grand Award Scholars. Mr. Frutkin, who was not named one of the top five finalists, was named as one of the ten to receive the thousand dollar award, which he will receive upon graduation. The award was based on his research paper about the "Development of High Lysine Corn Transferring the Opague-2 Gene Into Somatic Corn Protoplasts Via A Ds Element Vector and A ADHI Gene Marker", a project described by Frutkin to be "something about genetics". The project was due in early December and required that a proposal be made for the advancement of science. Mr. Frutkin began the project in connection with his Science Research class, a class consisting of five students and taught by Mrs. Ferris. According to Mr. Frutkin, he would never have begun the project without the class to encourage him.

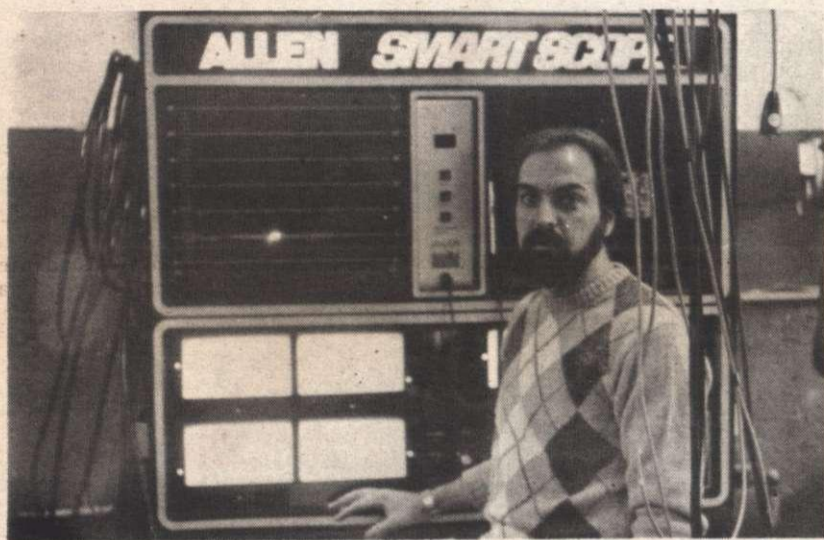

## Smartscope in Auto Shop

It doesn't walk. It doesn't talk. But, it's as good as or even better than a mechanic when it comes to diagnosing automobile problems. It's the Allen Smartscope diagnostic center.

What exactly does the Smartscope do? In reality, it is a mechanic's helper. If a customer has a complaint about his car, the mechanic will insert the symptoms into the diagnostic center's memory. The Smartscope will then inform the mechanic of the things that should be tested in order to determine the direct cause of the problem. The mechanic will then proceed to connect the extensions of the diagnostic center to various parts of the engine.

Now here's the interesting part. The Smartscope tells the mechanic what to do—such as how to alter the running of the engine or to check the ignition spark timing with its built in strobe light—so that it may properly carry out tests on the car's engine. After the Smartscope has completed its testing procedures, it correlates the data obtained from the tests, analyzes the results, and diagnoses the problem found. The mechanic may then proceed to repair the problem parts.

Mr. Nofi, who is presently in charge of

training sessions involving the Smartscope, says that in newer cars, a mechanic would not be able to determine what was wrong with a car without a diagnostic center because of all the electronics involved. According to Mr. Nofi, "It's hard to stay in business without such a diagnostic center."

But, why would Schreiber have a \$21,000.00 computer analysis system comparable to that used in Chrysler's and G. M.'s assembly lines? Mr. Nofi says that it's just the next step in the "push to incorporate computers" into our educational system. He has been trying to persuade the administration to buy one for 10 years. More and more schools are using them now. The fact that Schreiber has one is simply a plus as far as updating the curriculum is concerned.

Mr. Nofi is currently in the process of training both teachers and students to use the diagnostic center. He has found a great amount of interest among students. "It is good preparation for those interested in pursuing a career in mechanics." While the Smartscope will not replace a good trained mechanic, it will make the mechanic's job easier.

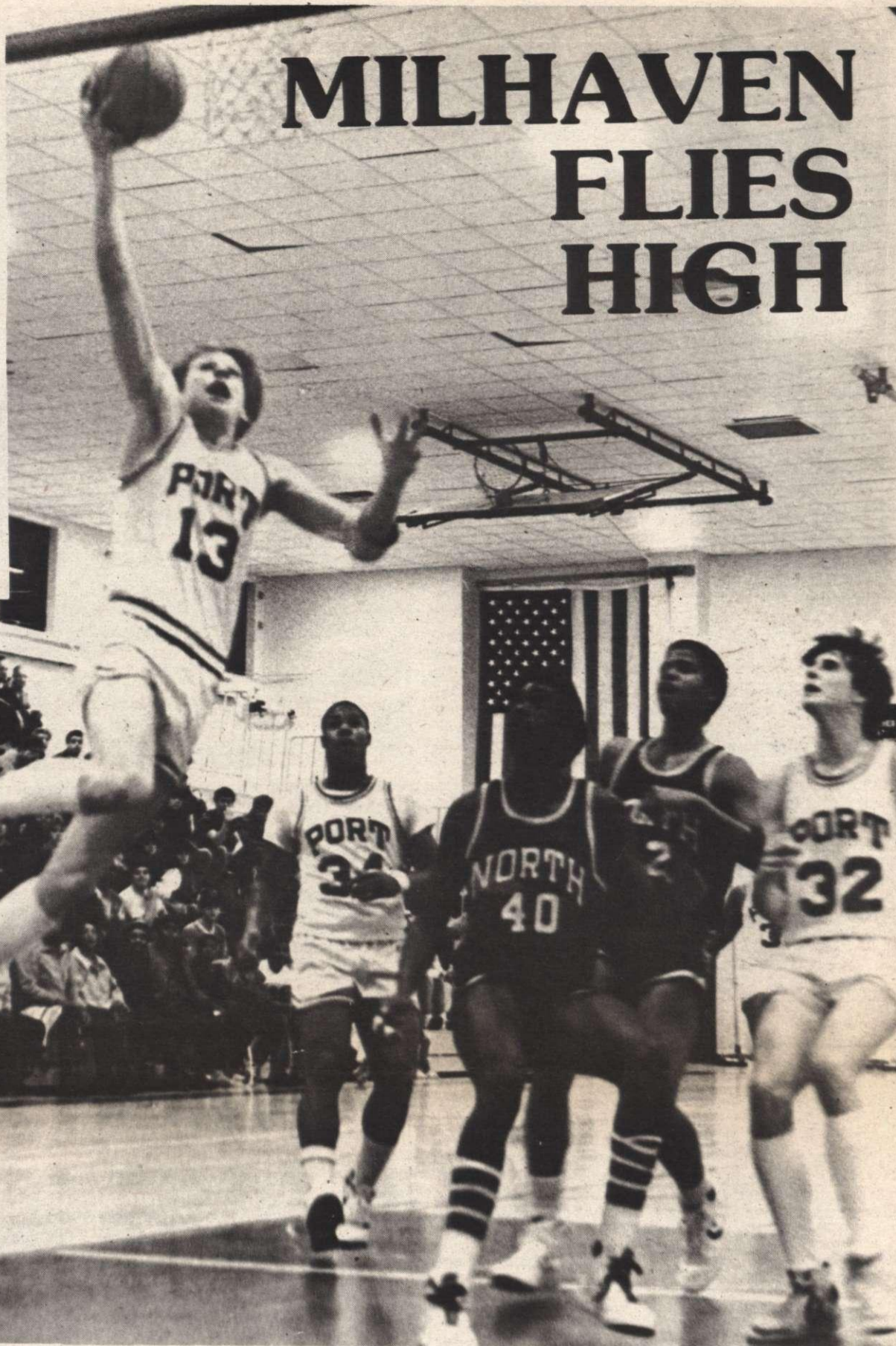

## Bernard King at Roslyn High

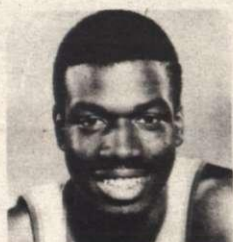

## Close But No Cigar for Girls BB

Schreiber girl's basketball team ALMOST did what no other team in American League-Conference 4 has done yet this season: beat Bethpage. But almost doesn't count and Bethpage has a perfect 12-0 record.

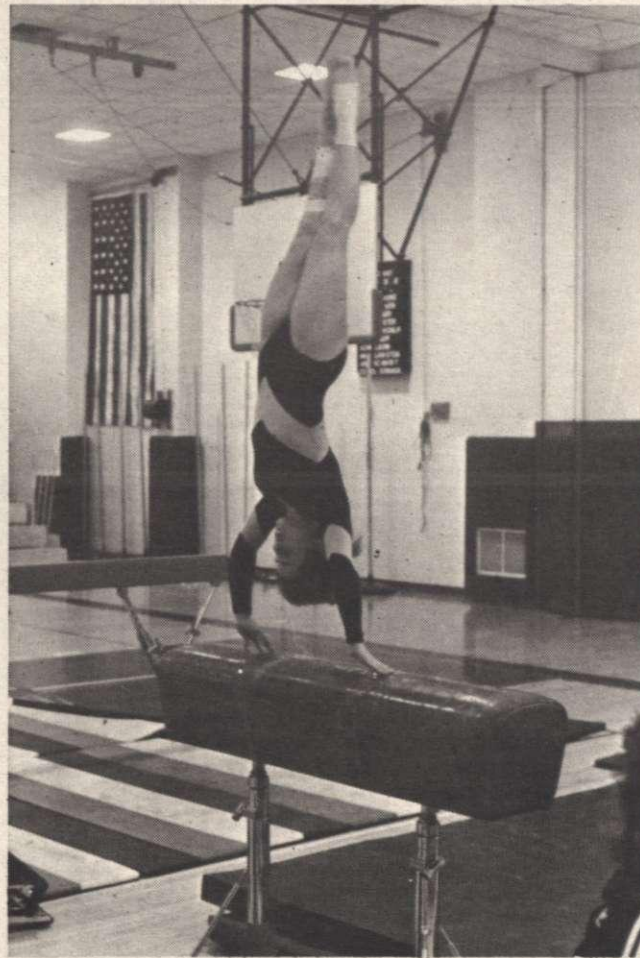
